This property is located in rural Jefferson County, north of Charles Town, along Warm Springs Road, which itself was a historic overland route which extended from Alexandria, Virginia to the mineral springs at Bath, now commonly known as Berkeley Springs.

2½-story Federal-style residence, built on a foundation of coursed rubble limestone, and finished in stucco, with the main section incorporating a gable-end orientation, with a laterally-oriented wing on the right side. The main section is three bays in width, with a centered entrance, suggestive of a central-passageway interior plan. This main entrance is accessed by a straight run stair shielded by a pedimented portico. Fenestration is generally flat-topped, with twelve-over-twelve sash; in the pediment of the gable on the facade is a semicircular fanlight.

Statement of Significance

"Hazelfield" was built by Ann Steven Dandridge Hunter, daughter of Adam Stephen, the founder of Martinsburg, and the widow, first of Alexander Sportswood Dandridge and, later of Col. Moses Hunter, a Revolutionary War veteran, member of the Virginia House of Delegates, and Berkeley County Clerk. Following the death of her son in the War of 1812, Mrs. Hunter moved from Martinsburg and built "Hazelfield." It is an outstanding example of Jefferson County Federal-style design and is listed individually in the National Register.
